Why Plan for Disasters?

- According to the <u>Federal Emergency Management</u> <u>Agency</u> (FEMA), more than 40% of businesses never reopen after a disaster, and for those that do, only 29% were still operating after two years.
- ► Those businesses that lost their information technology for nine days or more after a disaster? Bankruptcy within a year.
- ▶ Not good odds for any business or government agency

- March 28, 11am- Communication plan development and update
- ► April 25, 11am- Emergency training process & documentation
- May 30, 11am- Preparing for tabletop and/or functional exercises
- ▶ June 13, 11am- Developing a full-scale exercise to test your emergency plans
- ▶ June 27- 9am-3pm- An in-person training on how to conduct a full-scale drill training with an exercise at a member health center

CMS Emergency Prep Requirements

- In 2016, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid issued final Conditions of Participation (CoP) for 17 types of Medicaid and Medicare providers @ emergency management- FQHCs, RHCs, CMHA, hospitals, hospice, LTCs, etc.
- Requirements will include:
 - Conduct Risk Assessment and Planning
 - Develop Policies and Procedures

Hazard Vulnerability Analysis (HVA)

- A Hazard Vulnerability Analysis (HVA) pinpoints the hazards and/or vulnerabilities that need your special attention, the actions that might be taken to reduce the impact of those hazards, and what resources are likely to be needed to mitigate and prepare for hazards
- ▶ Uses a mathematical formula to assess a hazard such as wildfire against the probability it will likely happen to your business- higher the # the greater the likelihood it can impact your FQHC
- ► San Diego County modified the Kaiser Permanente HVA formula filled Excel formatted tool- Kaiser HVA Tool

HVA Tips

- Ask your healthcare planning partners and county office of emergency services for their HVA- same region, same hazards
- Conduct a HVA for every clinic site- possible different internal and external hazards and threats
- Review FQHC safety reports to highlight internal hazards such as IT, power or sewer failures
- ▶ Update an HVA after major business process updates such as adding new office sites or an upgraded computer system

CMS EM Compliance Readiness Self Assessment Tool

- Assign a value between 5 0 to determine your CMS compliance readiness level with 5 being most complete and 0 not complete at all.
- ► The scoring rubric will identify your emergency planning, training, and exercise gaps.
- Designed for you to assess your FQHC's:
 - Emergency Planning gaps
 - Communication Planning gaps
 - ► Training and Testing gaps

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CMS Self Assessment Scoring Rubric

- Conduct this self assessment with your FQHC safety committee and leadership?
 - ▶ 115- 80- You are on your way to CMS compliance! You most likely answered 4 or 5s for most questions
 - ▶ 79- 50- There are gaps in your emergency management program- you answered 4s and 3s
 - ► 49- 22- You have a long way to go to get to CMS compliance you answered 2s and 1s
 - ▶ 21-0 You are just getting started
